# Know the risks of your child's medication.\*

- Teens who were prescribed an opioid pain medication by grade 12 were at a 33% increased risk of misusing an opioid between ages 19 and 25.<sup>1</sup>
- 14% of local teens report misusing a prescription medication.<sup>2</sup>
- These medications carry *risks* (side effects, addiction, overdose).

#### \*Medications often misused by Maine teens:

Opioid pain medications (fentanyl, hydrocodone, hydromorphone, morphine, oxycodone, codeine), Adderall, Ritalin, Xanax. At the doctor's

#### Ask questions...

- What are the *dangers* of this medication?
- How much medication should my child take?
- *How and when* should my child *stop* taking this medication?
- Are there *other options?*

## At home

#### Secure...

- **Count the pills regularly** to make sure none are missing.
- Lock the medications in a safe place, out of sight of visitors and family members.
- Oversee each dose.
- Tell your teen that sharing this medication is dangerous and illegal.
